Construction Backlog Indicator



Architecture Billings Index

Readings above 50 indicate an increase in billings; readings below 50 indicate a decrease in billings.



The AIA/Deltek Architecture Billings Index (ABI), from the American Institute of Architects, is an economic indicator for nonresidential construction activity, with a lead time of 9-12 months. Readings above 50 indicate an increase in billings; readings below 50 indicate a decrease in billings.
