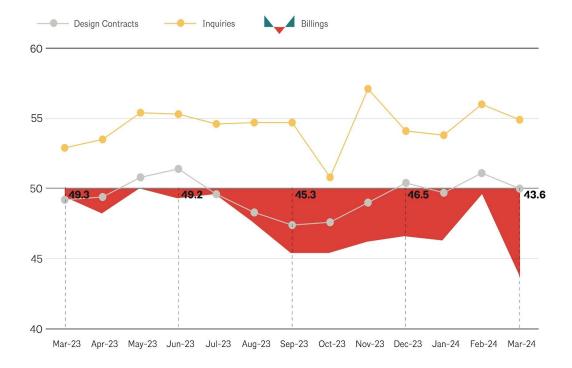
Architecture firm billings soften further in March
